



Amador Animal Disaster & Evacuation Shelter Plan

1. Upon activation by Amador Animal Control, OES, or the Sheriff, the AADE phone tree will commence. Unless otherwise requested, available AADE members will report in uniform to the county fairgrounds in Plymouth. Leave a message on any unavailable member answering machines asking them to call [Cathy 209-419-2383] for update. Bring your ready bag; trailer if you have one; crates; Gotya's. Uniform consists of AADE shirt, cap, long pants, gloves, closed toe shoes or boots, socks.
2. AC or SO will contact fairgrounds to get the livestock gate unlocked, as well as the horseshow office and log cabin livestock office.
3. Report in to the lead AADE person for assignment (Cathy Koos Breazeal; alternates Barbara Lacy, Karen Smart). Reporting location: log cabin livestock office deck.
4. Following ICS protocol, all work assignments will come from Animal Control to the AADE Lead to the AADE Team member individuals.
5. Intake tables (2): set up and supply one intake table at the choke point between the two livestock barns and set up other table in front of the Fur and Feathers Building. (Supplies: Chairs, card tables, canopy, paper, pens, tags, signage, clipboards, markers)
6. Signage: One sign at Hwy 49 directing evacuees with animals to enter the fairgrounds via the Livestock gate (thru the brick entryway). One sign at the fork in the grass parking area directing trailers down through the choke point and vehicles with small pets to the Fur/Feathers building. Another sign directing empty vehicles to exit back out through the Benny Brown Arena gate. If time permits, using spray paint, paint 1 red line for horses/livestock and 1 blue line for small animals. Ask evacuees to follow the red or blue line to their destination.
7. For human evacuees, once they have unloaded their animals, direct them out the arena gate and back out to Main Street. All human evacuees will park their vehicles in the Main Street parking lot at the front entrance of the fairgrounds. Trailers/Trucks of evacuees can be parked in the back overflow lot behind the livestock lot if needed.
8. Horses/large/small livestock: ensure each animal is ID'd, haltered/collared or somehow controlled. Goats/sheep/llamas: into the wood pens of the large livestock barn; keep separate by owner/address. Horses: into stalls in the horse barn; keep separate by

owner/address/one per stall. Cattle: Benny Brown Arena. Swine: wood pens of large livestock barn.

9. Dogs/Cats/small pets/exotics: Into wire crates (AC) and either in the Fur/Feather building or into the small livestock barn in rows. ID tag crates.
10. Intake forms: Keep original, give owner copy.
11. Reuniting animals: Owner or designated agent must show identification for release of animals.
12. Daily care: Set up a daily care board, assign tasks. Feeding, watering, walking, health monitoring.
13. Vet care.

Animal Control:

50 wire folding dog crates; [#] welded wire portable dog kennels; 40-50 halters/leads; pipe panels; kidding pens;

Food:

AC partners with the Feed Barn, Noah's Wish, Petco, Petsmart (Petsmart has a 53' truck with \$75K inventory available any time 300 or more animals are affected, includes crates, food, bowls, leashes).

Arena area:

There are 8-10 large permanent pens and more portable panels that can be place around the perimeter of the arena. Additionally, there are traveling fair panels that may be available depending on the date.

Horse Barns: 112 stalls

Exotics: There is a ranch in Sutter Creek with exotics (zebras, camels, etc)
