2. Approval of May Minutes - JH motioned FL seconded - All in favor (4) Absent (2)

3. Treasurer Report:

\$454,056.97 general fund; \$77,000 approximately unrestricted general fund.

In line to adhere to budget estimation. Ingress/Egress monies need to be spent, we are a bit behind because of the environmental compliance, which is now taken care of.

In budget summary, under revenue, \$2500 for miscellaneous grant funding (COVID-19 Relief grant award)

4. Coordinator's Report: (see Board Packet)

CAFSC Defensible Space grant application has been submitted.

I/E projects are being ramped up- further projects are encouraged to be submitted.

Firewise community assistance comes from I/E and Community Fuel Break grants.

There is a lot of strategy in regard to which grants fund which projects- multiple grants will fund certain documents depending on their timeline, specifications and deliverables.

Amador County Evacuation Improvement- asking for amendment to verbiage for a county wide CWPP- waiting to hear whether extension has been approved. Once that happens, we will focus on community education and outreach.

Pine Acres - NOE and surveys coming up.

Community Fuel Break project - received funding to plan 3 additional FB's. Beginning stages of planning Butte Mtn FB (10 acres). PG&E awarded approx. 30k for this project.

Recent Projects:

I/E - Sugar Pine site visit scheduled for amended project, less some ROE's. Bid packet for next group of proposed projects is being organized. Cost per acres have been going up and all local contractors are very busy- AFSC is trying to balance the work schedule regarding projects.

Clarification requested- what is the initial step for Community Fuel Break location designation-Placement is advised by AFSC. Maps and Forester are looking at veg type and parcels, past work, ridgelines, fire history- where it would be helpful to place. AFPD traditionally is not required for involvement, initially. PGYCC has been contracted for Fuel Break work in past.

JH - mastication work is good to go, but the concern lies in spending the money on these projects in the short amount of time. AFSC is working with the County for more projects.

5. Fair Booth planning - set in-person meeting and PM and JH will be present.

6. Mitchell Mine Maintenance & Demonstration Project Update (Brian Allen)

7. Board Recruitment Discussion:

Create an industry list over email and discuss at next meeting. Pull from list from 2019- send to the Board and add to and subtract. AW encourages representation from a Firewise lead. PM wants to discuss informal approach. JH is disappointed at by-laws- amendments had not been added.

8. Sirens Alert Systems Committee update:

CG and FL have been working with Sheriff Redman and Sgt. Bellotti. Sheriff is going to go over the quotes and continue discussion on whether it makes sense to implement. Possible requirement of grant funding to help with purchase- AFSC will entertain the idea.

9. Firewise:

28 communities registered communities in the county. 5 in-progress. Working with Assessor's office in providing parcel/mailing lists. County roads has granted placement of FW signs, process is starting. First Firewise Resource meeting has been scheduled and will address initial steps in becoming registered. Firewise Forum will focus more on established communities and best practices, networking and discussion. Firewise communities are submitting project proposals and are being very active.

10. Alert Wildfire Camera Project Update:

Frank - waiting on rerouting documentation (to USD, from UNR). Cameras are being divided between UNR and USD.





Gordon Long ARCD/AFSC Forestry Project Manager

I grew up on a 63,000-acre hunting and cattle ranch in Tehama County until age 9. At that time, our family moved to West Point, Calaveras County, where my grandfather (on my father's side) had started a choose and cut Christmas tree farm. My grandfather on my mother's side was a career rangeland manager for the US Forest Service. Three sides of our 20-acre farm in West Point was BLM property. My grammar school and high school years were spent running around the Mokelumne River watershed that we lived on. I graduated from Calaveras High in 1983. I Attended Cal Poly SLO and graduated in 1988

with a BS degree in Environmental and Systematic Biology. After college, I went to work for my father's business, Multiple Use Managers (MUM, Inc), as a wildlife biologist and hunting ranch manager. I worked for MUM full time from 1988 through 2015. In those years, I managed ranches in California, Oregon, Colorado, New Mexico, and Montana for the company.

In 1996, I married my wife, Megan Garamendi Long. We moved back to the ranch I grew up on in Tehama County, the Dye Creek Preserve in 2000 and started a family. My father had started the hunting program there in 1966, and I was proud to step in his footsteps. We have two wonderful daughters, Olivia Rose (b. 2001) and Anna Catherine (b. 2003). Both are currently in college- Olivia at UC Davis, and Anna at Chico State. In 2006, our family moved back to Calaveras County By 2015, MUM had lost a majority of our hunting ranch leases, and my job became purely part-time. I still run one hunting program on a lease basis in Humboldt County, which takes me away a few weeks each Fall.

In 2014 I started a wildlife non-profit foundation, the CalFauna Foundation, that was active between 2014 and 2019. In 2016, I became a founding board member of the Calaveras County RCD, after it was approved by county-wide vote during the June 2016 election. In 2018, I resigned from the Calaveras County RCD board to become their first Executive Director. The focus on funding for the Calaveras County RCD has from the outset been on forest health and fire prevention projects. In 2018, I also took a job with the Amador Resource Conservation District as a Resource Specialist, hired by ARCD District Manager Amanda Watson. In that role I was tasked to jump into the forestry field, since one of my duties with ARCD was to work under the umbrella of the Natural Resource Conservation Service to plan and write forestry contracts under their EQIP and RCPP programs. I remain an employee with ARCD currently, but recently took on a new position, as Forestry Project Manager for the ARCD. In that role, I will also have some managerial responsibilities for looking after some forestry projects for the Amador Fire Safe Council. This is a full-time position, so I decided to step down from the ED position that I held with Calaveras County RCD.

My outside interests all seem to be related to the outdoors. I am an avid hiker, angler, camper, adventurer, and photographer. My adventures have taken me to South Africa, Mexico, Canada, Bahamas, multiple trips to New Zealand and Australia, Argentina, Spain, and every Western US state, including Alaska and Hawaii. I also enjoy Western US history. If there is one person, other than my father, who I would like to emulate, that person would have to be US President Theodore Roosevelt. In my opinion, he is the gold standard by which the term "conservationist" should be gauged.
